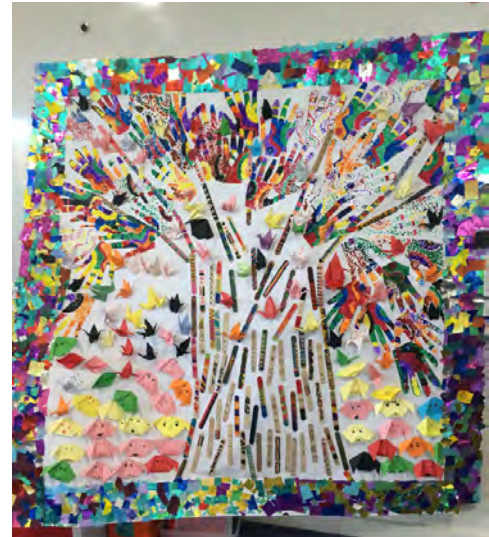
This is an opportunity for students, families/carers and teachers to talk about student learning. We look forward to you attending 3 Way Conferences and being involved in the school's program.

Students from Craigieburn Campus



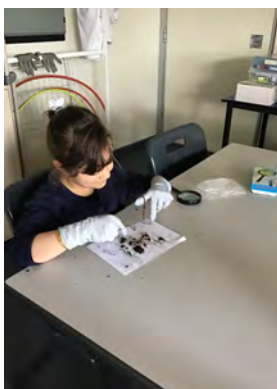
Last term, Craigieburn campus held a whole school Art Day and Art Exhibition.

As part of this term's unit on animals, B11 students are studying compost worms. The worms are the students' 'pets' for this term.

They learnt what pets are, why we have pets, and how to take care of their pets. They learnt that the compost worms require food, water, air and darkness.

The photos show the students identifying body parts using real worms. They also measured how long their worms were using wool. The students were engaged and fascinated by their 'pets'.

The Worm Farm is part of sustainable practices at our school. Together with our composting system, we are reducing our food waste that goes to landfill as the worms feed on our food scraps.
